The Plant Hardiness Zone Map was updated and improved in November of 2023, based on the addition of thousands more local weather stations. Many of our zones have moved up one category (warmer) because our area is getting warmer. We have been blessed with mild weather in the last few months. However, even though the temperature is getting warmer, we may still get hit with a few more really cold nights, so it is important to protect any tender plants in the garden. I have finally wrapped up my fig trees to keep the

branches from freezing.

In Jan, I will be busy making new gadgets for my garden. One useful thing to make is "Plant Locators" to mark my spring ephemerals when they appear in the spring. These locators help prevent accidental planting of annuals into empty-looking spots which actually conceal dormant ephemerals during the summer months. To make the marker, I will use a hot-glue gun to attach a glass marble atop a three-inch plastic golf tee.

In my spare time, I plan to organize my seed collection.

I have already started filling my new raised beds with branches that have broken and dropped during the strong winter winds. I only need no more than 12" of good soil for my vegetable bed. By filling the beds with branches and leaves that will settle down and compact during the winter, I'm saving a lot of money by not having to buy so much potting soil.
